### *Tech Trek Girls Bring Reports to Opening COV Meeting*

This summer, 18 girls from Carlsbad, Oceanside, Vista and San Marcos went to week-long Tech Trek camps representing our Branch. (San Marcos was added after their AAUW branch disbanded earlier this year.) Ten girls went to UC Irvine and 8 went to UCSD. Here are the first names and schools represented at the camps: From Carlsbad: Remy-Claire at Valley Middle School (MS); Sofia from Aviara Oaks MS.; and Mia from Calavera Hills MS. From Oceanside, Abigail and Nicole from Lincoln MS; Mary Helen and Leslie from Martin Luther King MS; and Vivian from Jefferson MS. Representing Vista were Kimberly from Vista Innovation; Arlyn from Vista Magnet MS; Alice from Madison MS; Sarina from Rancho Minerva MS; and Sierra and Emily from Roosevelt MS (which is located in Oceanside.) San Marcos girls were Kelana and Kaityln from San Elijo MS, Marilu from San Marcos MS, and Sasha from Double Peak. Each of the girls selected were rising eighth-graders. Our meeting was an occasion where 12 of the 18 shared with our members the excitement of STEM-fields learning in a hands-on campus environment. **Faye Capps** is our Branch Leader for Tech Trek. She, **Ele Lavender**, and the Tech Trek committee handle interviewing candidates and fundraising for future selections. **Seena Trigas** helped secure grants from Genentech and Oceanside-Carlsbad Soroptimist International, and \$1,125 was raised at the event from our members.

## Public Policy Matters

Can you remember the day you first learned about AAUW? Maybe you recall that special thing that made you think, “Yes – I want to be a part of that!” Was it the desire to join the fight to help all women achieve economic self-sufficiency? Or maybe it was the idea of finding ways to guarantee equality, individual rights and social justice for the underserved in your community that got your juices flowing.

Now here you are, two to ten years and 120 bridge games, lunches or book discussions later – and public policy is just a report you hear each month from your branch PP chair. What if you could fit in just one extra hour, maybe two, each month to rekindle your passion for doing something that would make a big difference in the lives of girls and women?

In many branches all the work is left to the Public Policy chair. But one person can only do so much. We are still fighting for equal pay for equal work; still being denied promotions and access to power; still facing workplace policies that make it harder on women than men to balance life/work responsibilities; still watching female athletes being denied equal access on playing fields and in coaching positions; still watching state after state pass laws restricting our access to safe, effective family planning methods of our choice; still afraid of sexual violence on campus, and domestic violence in the home, and physical violence in the military.

Any of these making you mad? Are you ready to join the chorus and declare, “We’re not going to just keep taking it?” Your state Public Policy Committee wants to remind you that Public Policy *Still Matters*, and encourages you to contact your branch PP co-chairs today to ask “What can I do to make a difference?”
